My name is Marianne. I recently moved to Suffolk, but I was raised in Tottenham, North London. I moved to Essex in 1973. Where I was a Primary School Teacher for most of my working life. Having retired from my post as Headteacher and Acting Headteacher I then went on to train teachers. I was lucky to have enjoyed my career and never lost my sense of satisfaction and pride at being able to work with amazing children and their families and being an inspiration to a new generation of teachers.

I am married and have three children and three beautiful young grandchildren who now keep my husband and I entertained and very busy when we are not enjoying holidays, walking our dog, or pursuing our other hobbies which include Morris Dancing, singing, and going to the theatre.



In 1978 we were expecting our 2nd child. I had carried the baby for 40+ weeks when I was told that the baby would not survive once it was born. We never saw our baby, a girl whom we called Louise and for more than 40 years we tried to find out what had happened to her. By chance, my husband found out about the Charity, Brief Lives - Remembered. He made contact and gave them the information we had about Louise's birth and death.

We were so happy to receive the news that they had managed to find out the whereabouts of our baby's ashes. We had found her. We are both so grateful and are now arranging for her birth and death to be permanently marked by adding her name to a family headstone in the cemetery where we lived until we moved to Suffolk. Myself, my husband and our 3 children will have a short remembrance at that spot very soon.

Paula from Brief Lives Remembered, asked If I would be interested in becoming a Trustee for the charity. I felt honoured to be considered and knowing what important work they do to trace babies and give parents support in their loss, I am very much looking forward to helping the charity in their work. This will be a new venture for me. I need no convincing of what importance this work is for families looking for answers to delicate and distressing questions.

members and friends can commemorate the
all-too-brief lives of their babies., knowing that
thousands of other families elsewhere in the
world will be doing the same.

The week is also crucial opportunity for people to
talk openly about the subject of and raise
awareness of baby loss.

Anthony

My mum Dolly married Derek 26th June 1954. My mum went from being the youngest child of 5 to a wife living in married quarters at Basingstoke. Dolly hated being away from her family in Hackney London and so when her first baby was due, she returned home. Her 3 sisters and brother all married lived on the same street, Mabley Street, as her mum and dad. Plus aunts and uncles. Dolly already had 3 nephews.

The next part of this story I pieced together with the help of Brief Lives - Remembered and what I had learnt from family. Mum stayed at jeans house to have the baby. The midwife was apparently there for 3 days and wouldn't call a doctor. She apparently sat

knitting. Measuring her knitting on mums foot. Eventually Anthony was born on 27th May. He was what a midwife would call 'flat'. The midwife did all sorts to resuscitate him and eventually he began to cry. A doctor came and gave my mum twilight gas to stitch up the horrendous damage that had been done.

The midwife told mum not to touch Anthony. I imagine he had a high-pitched cry that the midwife would have associated with cerebral irritation. My aunt checked on them in the



morning with their mum. Anthony had died. He had been 6 hours old. My mum never held him.

With the help of Brief Lives - Remembered I have been able to find out where my brother was buried. My mum believed he had been buried with an elderly lady on the street, but I think the family must have fabricated that to make her feel a little better. Brief Lives - Remembered gave me the dates and where Anthony is buried.

All I could think was how my poor dad had to register the birth and death of he's baby. I have since obtained a birth certificate and death certificate. Following he's Autopsy the cause of death was a tentorial tear.

My mum never spoke about her loss. She went on to have me 2 years later. I was born on 26th May 1957. Which must have been an awful reminder for her too.

I now have my brother's name and date of birth. Anthony Archer born 27th May 1955 to Dolly and Derek Archer. Died 28th May 1955.




Connecting Up on Facebook

This wonderful charity does amazing work in tracing babies born dead. This is my story. How many more Mums and Dads can relate to my story... I delivered a dead baby in 1966 in the Louise Margaret Maternity unit Aldershot.

My hubby was a serving soldier. When our son (Andrew) was born he was immediately wrapped up and disposed of!!!! Never to be spoken about againIt was both cruel and barbaric the way us parents were treated. If you were fortunate enough that your baby breathed for just a few minutes, it was given its own resting place where our son was buried.

Unfortunately, the ones who sadly had died in the womb weren't. They were either placed with another person being buried at that time. Or buried in a communal grave. The grief was unbearable. Our every waking hour was filled with "where is he" Has he been incarcerated because he wasn't worthy of a dignified burial because he was dead. Not like now. When newly born still born or those babies that have lived for a while. These parents have the privilege of arranging a beautiful service for their loved ones. The closest my late hubby and I got to was discovering the SANDS Garden of Remembrance at the Lichfield Arboretum, we laid a memorial for him. Which gave me a little closure not that we wanted closure he is very much part of our family unit.



We were given the contact number for SANDS. Who put us in touch with this wonderful woman Paula Jackson. She spends her spare time tracing babies who were just taken away. It was the most amazing experience we have encountered ever... We have had the privilege of meeting her a couple of times.

After giving her some information and details she fortunately a couple of weeks later came up with our answers...This was overwhelming to say the least. We met Paula at the cemetery in Aldershot and with the help of the register book we were able to go to the area where the unknown (dead babies) were buried in a communal grave in the children's section of the cemetery. Paula does such remarkable work I was wondering.



How many people out there went through the same thing as us.... I have connected with one lady ON Facebook who also had the privilege of meeting this saint. It would be great meeting up with like-minded people. Would love to connect with other bereaved parents who didn't have any contact with their much-wanted babies... At last father and son are reunited. My chair is waiting. Much love Gill


Focus on Books

I'd always known I had a little brother called Oliver in heaven. Mum told my sister and I just enough, but no details on what happened and why he was born sleeping. It was not until I had my own children that realized just how traumatic it must have been for mum. I don't know what prompted the discussion, but mum


opened up and told me exactly what happen at the end of her pregnancy with my brother. When I asked where my brother was taken to be buried mum explained that she didn't know. She said the undertakers took him and she didn't get to see him. I can't imagine the mix of emotions mum must have felt over the last 40 years. I asked mum if she would be ok with me trying to track down his final resting



place, to which she agreed. Fortunately for us Brief Lives – Remembered was the first organization I contacted. Paula was so lovely. We now live in Australia, so the time difference was a little challenging, but she found baby Oliver in no time at all. Some may say this gives us closure and it does feel like a weight has been lifted now we know where he is, but it has also opened a new chapter in our lives, and we are looking forward to visiting him to make an appropriate memorial next to time we are in the UK. My Mum, Sister, Dad, and myself are extremely grateful for Brief Lives – Remembered and the help they gave us.



Holding Her, At Last, Forever



"Holding Her, At Last, forever" 9x12" Mixed Media Oil, oil pastel, pencil, copper leaf Painted by Linda Jones I am happy to share with newsletter members my painting of my mother holding my rendition of my older stillborn sister born in Cardiff, Wales in 1947. It was with the help of Brief Lives - Remembered that I was able to find the mass, unmarked grave of my sister this past May. A link sent to me for Cardiff cemeteries meant that within a day, even though I was in Canada where my parents and I immigrated in 1957 and the local council I was dealing with was in Britain I was given the name of the cemetery and the plot number of my sister 's resting place. She lies with other babies and children in plot EJ58 in Cathays Cemetery in Cardiff.

By email, I quickly negotiated with Cardiff Council, which owns the cemetery, to have a plain wooden cross made for my sister and put on the grave.

But first I needed to find out when my sister was born so that I could put that on the cross. I worked with the General Registry Office and eventually received a copy of my sister's stillborn certificate. I began to cry when I imagined my mother filling out this certificate a few weeks after her daughter's birth, being presented with a piece of paper that had no column in which she could put a name for her child.



I learned from the certificate that my sister had been born on February 11, 1947. From the burial record I had earlier received from Cardiff Council, I knew that she had been buried four days later on February 15, 1947, as "Stillbirth Jones".

I then had the task of naming my sister since I did not want her to continue on this earth as an unnamed child. I knew that my mother had picked the name Linda for her first baby but was never able to give her that name. So I honored my mother's wishes and chose my name as my sister's first name. My mother's two middle names are Catherine and Cora. I am Linda Catherine. I chose Cora for my sister's second name and in honor of my Welsh dad I chose the Welsh name Ceri as her third middle name. While sitting by the grave in Cardiff in May, my sister became Ceri to me.

Despite fears of flight disruptions because Covid I knew that I had to go. I became the first person in my sister's family to be able to visit her grave in 75 years.

On May 1, 2022, I flew from Toronto airport into Heathrow, immediately took a train to Cardiff and booked into my hotel in the city centre.

I stayed two weeks and spent each afternoon at the cemetery. I began to garden to add to the cement plant holder I had brought with me filled with artificial pink and white

roses for my sister. Over two weeks I bought both real and artificial flowers to build a visible grave for my sister and David - the only other Found child in her plot born a year and a half later whose broken cross lay on top of the grave - and all the others.

As expected, the trip was difficult, sad, and necessary. My parents died in 2012 and 2016 without ever knowing where their child was buried. I know that there are many who belong to this organization who know exactly what I am talking about.

As I sat at the grave each day and took a break with my mug of coffee after gardening, I cried and spoke to my sister. I felt that my mother's powerful feelings of repressed grief and my own grief were coming up, through me and finally being expressed.

For I realized later in my life that I had tried to take on my mother's grief and that I also as the subsequent child had been affected by her grief over the loss of her first child and the terrible way that she and my dad along with tens of thousands of others were treated.

I am 70 now. My sister would be seventy-five. I am retired from working life and one of the things I began to do was paint.

Before my trip to Cardiff in May I had started a series of what would be four portraits of my parents that centered on my mother. I was thinking of her a great deal as I thought about the trip coming up.

When I got home to Canada and began the fourth and final painting, which you see in this newsletter, I decided I needed to incorporate my mother holding her stillborn daughter. As many of you will know, she never saw her child, never held her, and when my parents asked where their child was buried, they were stonewalled. Like all the others, eventually they gave up.

At my sister's grave I realized that it was probably part of some great plan that it would be me that would come to visit her. I don't believe my parents could've stood at that spot, quite lovely on the surface, knowing what had happened to their child and knowing it was not what they would have chosen for her.
