## Kingston Hospital Memorial Service

## We hold an annual Babies Memorial Service (this takes place on the last Sunday in June at

3pm in the Restaurant Garden Atrium area of the Hospital) This is a simple ceremony which is inclusive for those of all beliefs and life philosophies using reflection, poetry, music, and an opportunity for families to light a candle in memory of their baby.

We also offer our bereaved families the opportunity to have their baby's name in the Baby Memorial Book which we hold on display throughout the year, with the pages being turned each day by our pastoral team. Each week the babies to be remembered in that 7-day period are named in a simple service of prayer by our Chaplains.

# In Memory of our Daughter Claire Louise McCarthy

In Memory of the baby daughter, we never saw, we never held, never said we loved her and never got to say God bless to and our goodbyes to - she deserved better than that.

Our daughter was still born, my wife went through the latter part of her pregnancy knowing that her baby would be stillborn, I cannot imagine, and still cannot imagine to this day what she went through, and I continue to beat myself up, quite rightly so, for not being more understanding, caring and supportive.

We were only in our early twenties.

I have always been a firm supporter of the NHS, but on reflection, the support from the Hospital at this time was non-existent.



All I can remember when collecting my wife was that there was no empathy due to our great loss, no discussion on what and why the baby died.

We were told, by a clerical member of staff, not a medical or nursing member of staff, that we were young enough to go away and try again and that I needed to go to the office to pay a burial fee.

We left the hospital numb and resumed our lives, two young people continuing to make a life together, and yet I cannot remember how we felt or reacted as the following days / weeks/ months / years went by.

Then in my later years I came across 'Brief Lives- Remembered' and reading what they were doing woke up to the fact that I could perhaps trace the resting place of our daughter – so I got in touch with Paula.

Thanks to Paula's work, I now know after some 47 years of the resting place of our daughter and for the first time in my life was given a copy of an entry into a burial record recording her death, the first time in my life to see something tangible that our daughter was real as brief as it was.

Her resting place was recorded at Kensal Green Cemetery, which I visited in 2020 and was somewhat shocked to see the rather unsightly state and how unkept it was.

Again, thanks to Paula's work I found out that in the 70's stillborn babies were buried in communal graves, at Kensal Green Cemetery there was no historical

record of the location of this grave within the cemetery. Cemetery records go back tens / hundreds of years, but it would seem that the local Authority

Gave no importance to this type of grave; sadly, therefore I could not stand over her grave to say a little pray.

We would have christened her Claire or Louise, the date of birth is a blur and unclear to me, all I have is a burial receipt dated 2nd October 1973 (£2.25p) and latterly thanks to Paula's investigations a recorded burial date of 2nd November 1973.

A fitting inscription to mark her resting place would read 'I will sleep in peace until you come to me'.

Now in my 70's to reflect on what might have been becomes more and more painful, I know that I should have done more.

Claire / Louise would have had a little sister Joanna Louise born 1st October 1976.

Lavina\*, my wife, died in July 2002, resting with her family and at last, I hope with her daughter.

# Happily Reunited - At Last

My name is Paula, and I was born in 1958 in the premature baby unit at a London hospital. To be quite honest, although I've always known that I am a twin, nothing was ever really spoken about it I can only assume that in those days parents were told to forget about it and get on with life. During snippets of conversations over the years my Mum said that my twin brother and I were born very prematurely, and it was thought that neither of us would survive. As we were both so unwell, we were immediately baptized at birth by a catholic midwife. A few days following the traumatic birth and



death of her baby boy, Mum became very upset and was told by one of the nurses to "pull yourself together - at least you might be going home with one of your babies" ..... so much for bereavement counselling. Mum also said that as my brother hadn't survived, his birth hadn't been registered and that he had been buried at the foot of a catholic woman's grave. I did ask what my brother's name would have been, and mum said "probably Martin" after my dad.

Roll on nearly 62 years later to February 2020 when I popped in to see my younger brother Liam, on my way home from visiting my mum and dads grave, Liam asked if I had seen a segment on BBC news about a charity called Brief Lives - Remembered. I hadn't but luckily, he had recorded It. I watched the broadcast and immediately emailed the charity. I didn't hold out much hope as far as I was aware my brother didn't have a birth and death certificate. I received a reply from the charity saying that they had been inundated with requests following the programme and that I would be placed on a waiting list. Then covid hit! Later that year I contacted the charity again and was told due to the pandemic searches were difficult and that I was still on the waiting list.

In July 2022, I happened to be in conversation with a group of people and one of the group mentioned how easy it was to search and obtain

Certificates. I thought that this couldn't be correct surely birth certificates are private. So I decided to have a look and see if I could locate mine (even though, I have already got it). Well after trawling through a huge volume of handwritten entries I found mine and to my amazement, a few lines up saw an entry for Martin McCarthy, same date, and place of birth as mine. I couldn't believe it.

I immediately contacted the registrar, explained that I thought this related to my twin brother and requested a copy of the birth certificate and asked whether a search could be undertaken for a death certificate within a week of the birth. Within days I received copies of Martins handwritten birth and death certificates both registered on the same day both signed by my dad. My BROTHER EXISTED. Martin had lived for four days, and his cause of



death was prematurity. It was such a strange feeling to know that my brother had a name and also to see my dad's signature, which I hadn't seen in 21 years since his death.

I immediately emailed Brief Lives - Remembered to see whether I was yet at the top of the waiting list. I received a reply from Paula to say that I had been contacted the year previous and as I hadn't replied it was assumed that I no longer wanted the search undertaken. Luckily, I had never received the email as at that stage I didn't have certificates or indeed a name. Paula asked me to email the details and that a search would be carried out. Two or three days later, I received an email from Paula asking me to contact her as she had news. Amazingly, Paula had found my brother's resting place. The cemetery where Martin had been laid to rest was local to where we had been brought up and across the road from where my brother Liam lived when he first got married.


Following this most wonderful discovery there were several trips to the cemetery in order to locate the exact plot, discussions with the cemetery team as to the types of memorials allowed and visits to the funeral directors to commission a crucifix for Martin.... we were ready to go! I googled

Catholic churches near to the cemetery and picked one randomly. There I spoke to FR Adrian, the kindest, most compassionate priest (an identical twin himself, what were the chances of that?) who kindly agreed to accompany us to the grave, to pray with us for Martin and to consecrate the ground. A date was arranged for 26/10/22, I travelled up to London, collected my brother Liam and my sister-in-law and off we set. We arrived at the church, with the aid of sat nav, and arrived at the beautiful 170-year-old church, hidden away in central London, full of original features and amazing stained-glass windows through which the sun was shining and bouncing the colour around the church.... such a wonderful atmosphere. To our surprise Fr Adrian had arranged a short vigil service for Martin with a printed order of service so that we could fully participate. Fr Adrian also entered the details of Martin's birth and death in the parish records so that he is now included as one of the parish family and will be prayed for each year on his birthday.

Fr Adrian accompanied us to the cemetery where we prayed at the graveside and then Fr Adrian blessed the ground and the crucifix. Considering that it was the end of October, it was unseasonably warm, and the sun was shining through the trees reflecting off the brass inscription on the crucifix. The Inscription says "Baby Martin McCarthy with love from your twin sister Paula and brother Liam. "We will always wonder who you would have been". We were joined by my nephew and the service ended with my brother playing "He ain't heavy, he's my brother" by the Hollies on his Phone. I actually thought that my heart was going to burst with joy.

This journey has been full of strange and happy coincidences that I can only think it was meant to be. My eternal gratitude to Brief Lives - Remembered for filling a hole in my heart that I didn't know existed.

This is a song that I wrote in 3/4 timing about the stillbirth of my older sister born in 1947 in Cardiff. The title comes from the name given to the morgue. It is written first from the perspective of my mother, thinking of that daughter, then my father and his thoughts about his lost daughter, and then my thoughts as an older person reflecting on how I tried to carry the grief for my parents. The last verse is about my trip in May 2022 from Canada to Cardiff to be the first one in my family to visit my sister 's grave in Cathays Cemetery in Cardiff. It was with the help of Paula from Brief Lives- Remembered that I was able within days in 2021 to find that long-lost grave. I had a cross put on it and, sadly, chose a name for my sister: Linda Cora Ceri Jones.

## Always in our hearts

For the first time in forty-two years, my wife Michelle and I have been able to go to our son's grave.

On the 13th of February 1981. Our son Christopher was born sleeping. The hospital dealt with all the arrangements.

I was fortunate to see Christopher before all was done, later that they when Michelle was feeling she could cope we asked if it was possible to see Christopher again only to be told that it was too late.

As you can imagine our world fell apart. We were told so many things all of which we later found out to be lies.



But last year we found where Christopher was laid to rest, and we have been able as a family to put closure on a difficult time in our lives.

So this year forty-two years later we have been able to say how much we miss him and that his brief life will always be remembered.


## Loss by Donna Ashworth

# My Daughter

I had a daughter, who, due to incompetence of the medical profession, died at birth. Now, this was back in 1964 (the bad old days) as I am sure, some of you will remember. I was very poorly following the birth and for some reason, blanked out from my mind thoughts of what would follow, i.e., registering the death and a burial. I had no follow up, counselling or explanations, and my then husband obviously dealt with the officialdom.



We had two successful births following this awful experience, one, my son, eleven months on and then, a daughter, so although I mourned every year and never forgot her, life took over. My ex died a few years ago and I had never enquired details from him.

Luckily, I heard of Brief Lives and through their wonderful service, I found where my darling baby was buried and applied for the relevant

certificate. When I finally visited her burial site, a public cemetery, it completely traumatised me....no exact spot, no markers, just rough ground.

I decided to have a memorial plaque placed in a Jewish cemetery where, had I have been of sound mind all those years ago, I would have had her buried. My dear Rabbi came to make a blessing and my family and just three friends attended. It has been cathartic to know that she has been acknowledged and memorialised.

I can now acknowledge that I am the mother of three children, but one is no longer with us.... gone, but not forgotten.
