My Daughter

In 1968 at 17 years old I found myself pregnant to my boyfriend who was 4 years older than me and who I thought I was madly in love with. I realized years later just how naive and unworldly I was, like many others at that time.

My parents were horrified and very disappointed and there was no question other than we get married. I couldn't have the lovely white wedding I had dreamed of but just the register office. We went to live with his parents as we had no money and there was no room at my parents.

The day following the marriage he slapped me, in front of his mother and sister, because I didn't want to go to a neighbor's house on my own.



It was not a happy house, and I was very unhappy in that atmosphere. My pregnancy was not an easy one, terrible morning sickness and kidney problems. I loved being pregnant and feeling my baby kick. At 35 weeks I went into labor though didn't realize immediately. I went into Princess Royal Maternity Home the following morning and baby Jane was born at 5.15pm on 13 May 1969. She weighted exactly 4 lbs., the only time I saw her was when the staff showed me her wrapped in sort of tin foil before she was taken to Huddersfield Infirmary. I was told she

needed to go there for specialist care, and I never saw her again. I repeatedly asked to be transferred to the hospital but was told in no uncertain terms that was not possible. I was in a ward with all the mothers and their babies.

On the Friday I had no visitors and remember being very upset and hid under the covers. I asked many times for news of Jane's condition and was told she was ok but may need surgery. On the Sunday my husband visited me at evening visiting though I remember being very sad and tearful and he didn't want to talk about Jane. Later that evening, I think about 9pm a nurse came and pulled the curtains round my bed, my husband then came in and I could see by his face something was wrong. Jane had passed away. The following day I was discharged. I asked him what had happened to Jane and was told "in such circumstances the hospital take care of the dead babies". He said it was for the best as we had no money and that was how it had to be. I was naturally very upset but dare not question him further. I knew a notice of her birth had been put in the local paper and got hold of a copy. However no notice of her death was put in and I was told it was waste of money.

On returning to my in-laws' home I was greeted by my mother-in-law who was knitting a baby coat which had been for my daughter. Her words to me as I came in the door were "I know I was knitting this for you but I'm knitting it for someone else, you just have to get on with it". How cruel was that. I have to admit that my own mother never said a word about my daughter's death when I visited, I had to deal with the grief on my own.

We saved hard and put deposit on a house, but it was never a partnership, he made the decisions and I accepted that's how it was. He decided he didn't want the responsibility of children and though I adored children I accepted and made the sacrifice. I even made excuses that I couldn't get pregnant. I supported him in whatever he wanted to do and worked hard alongside him. There were

a number of times he hit me in the early days of marriage. There were happy times but also very unhappy ones too.

Over the years I mourned Jane and that I hadn't had children but kept it inside. The relationship deteriorated, the last 10 years to the point I was fearful and wanted out of the marriage. In October 2019 I discovered whilst doing the family tree that Jane's date of birth had been recorded on the wrong date. I then heard about Brief Lives and within 2 weeks with their help I discovered that she had been buried in a cemetery in Huddersfield, but no actual plot could not be identified. A number of babies are buried in an area. I wanted to put right the wrong date of birth so applied to Kirklees to correct this. I had to get evidence of her correct birth date and my doctor was able to provide the evidence which was accepted. What it did uncover however was that my husband's sister registered her birth and death, pretending to be me the mother. She obviously knew the undertaker and the date she was buried and where. She flatly denies this, but I have seen the original birth and death certificate which she signed claiming to be the mother. How can someone do this. I questioned my husband about this, and he claimed to know nothing about the burial, he couldn't even remember his daughter's name. He claims I am mental raising this after 51 and I need treatment and that he could not remember and believes his sister that she had nothing to do with it. They concocted a story that the undertaker dealt with it.



They denied me of knowing for all these years where my daughter was buried and worse that I could have actually gone to her burial. They then suggested they did it to save me from grieving.

I left my husband in December 2019 and have absolutely no regrets, only that I should have done it much sooner.

I visit the site and have made a little garden round a beautiful copper beach tree within the vicinity of where she is buried.

I refuse to tell him where she is but as he couldn't remember her name what does he care? I don't want him knowing either.



Thank You

I would like to thank Paula for dedicating her time and expertise to Helping others, our mother did not like to talk about the baby she lost so without Paula's help my sister and I would have no record at all of the date our sister was born and died or where she was buried. As our father is estranged but still alive, we were unable to obtain the birth/death certificate. Finally, she is part of our family once more and we are able to add her to our family. We also have the comfort that she was buried with a local lady rather than alone.

My Brother's Resting Place

When I was three years old, my baby brother, Ben, died of cot death. His death is my earliest memory, and I can recall images of that day. However, due to my parents' immense grief, we children were not taken to the funeral, and there is no grave. The death is rarely talked about in my family.

I first read about Brief Lives - Remembered a couple of years ago in a BBC news article, and my interest was immediately sparked. I contacted Paula for more information although I was not ready to request support at that point. I had been working for some time to process the buried emotions from the death and it had not been easy.



Eventually, this Spring, I asked Brief Lives - Remembered to trace Ben's resting place and was amazed at how quickly they found the answer! I now know that he was cremated, and where his ashes are scattered. This has given me hope that I will gradually be able to come to terms with events of the past and find peace. I was also able to leave a tribute on the Brief Lives -Remembered website: "Baby Ben, died January 1985. Loved and missed by your sister".


I am so grateful for the unique service and kind support offered. This has been an important milestone in my journey. Thank you.

The heartache of miscarriage, stillbirth, or infant death affects thousands of families every year. *Empty Cradle, Broken Heart, Third Edition* offers reassurance to parents who struggle with anger, guilt, and despair during and after such a tragedy. In this new and updated edition, Deborah Davis encourages grieving and strives to cover many different kinds of loss, including information on issues such as the death of one or more babies from a multiple birth, pregnancy interruption, and the questioning of aggressive medical intervention. There is also a special chapter for fathers as well as a chapter on "protective parenting" to help anxious parents enjoy their precious living children. Doctors, nurses, relatives, friends, and other support persons can gain special insight. Most importantly, parents facing the death of a baby will find necessary support in this gentle guide.
